### EXECUTIVE ORDER

#### **Extending Executive Order D 2020 230 Directing the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment to Make One-Time Direct Stimulus Payments to Qualifying Individuals Experiencing Economic Hardships Caused by COVID-19 in Colorado**

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor of the State of Colorado and, in particular, pursuant to Article IV, Section 2 of the Colorado Constitution, the relevant portions of the Colorado Disaster Emergency Act, C.R.S. § 24-33.5-701, *et seq.*, and C.R.S. § 24-33.5-1106, I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, hereby issue this Executive Order extending Executive Order D 2020 230 directing the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment (CDLE) to make one-time direct stimulus payments to qualifying individuals experiencing economic hardships caused by coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) in Colorado.

#### **I. Background and Purpose**

On March 5, 2020, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's (CDPHE) public health laboratory confirmed the first presumptive positive COVID-19 test result in Colorado. Since then, the number of confirmed cases has continued to climb, and we have evidence of widespread community transmission throughout the State. I verbally declared a disaster emergency on March 10, 2020, and on March 11, 2020, I issued the corresponding Executive Order D 2020 003, as amended by Executive Orders D 2020 018, D 2020 032, D 2020 058, D 2020 076, D 2020 109, D 2020 125, D 2020 152, D 2020 176, D 2020 205, D 2020 234, and D 2020 258. On March 25, 2020, I requested that the President of the United States declare a Major Disaster for the State of Colorado, pursuant to the Stafford Act. The President approved that request on March 28, 2020.

My administration, along with other State, local, and federal authorities, has taken a wide array of actions to mitigate the effects of the pandemic, prevent further spread, and protect against overwhelming our health care resources.

The economic impacts of COVID-19 are significant, and threaten to undermine the economic stability of many Coloradans and local businesses. The risk of contamination posed by COVID-19 necessitated closure of multiple businesses. Employers and employees in virtually all sectors of the economy have been hard hit. While we have seen indications that our efforts to "flatten the curve" are working, transmission of the virus continues to threaten Coloradans' way of life and livelihoods.

Since March 15, 2020, hundreds of thousands of Coloradans have filed for and received unemployment insurance benefits to help pay for groceries, rent, and utilities to weather the hardships caused by COVID-19. As of August 2020, employment rates among workers making less than \$27,000 decreased by 15% compared to January 2020, while workers making more than \$60,000 have almost returned to their January 2020 employment rates. Many Coloradans continue to rely on unemployment insurance to meet their basic needs.

On March 20, 2020, I issued Executive Order D 2020 012, which mobilized State resources to improve and expedite services available to individuals applying for unemployment insurance benefits to promote the economic stability of the State. Subsequently, I issued Executive Orders D 2020 031, D 2020 051, and D 2020 088, which extended the availability of the resources issued in Executive Order D 2020 012. On June 13, 2020, I issued Executive Order D 2020 100, which further extended these resources to improve and expedite unemployment insurance benefits. Executive Order D 2020 100 was extended by Executive Orders D 2020 133, D 2020 161, D 2020 184, and D 2020 215.

On October 30, 2020, I issued Executive Order Executive Order D 2020 230 to allow CDLE to make one-time direct stimulus payments through the unemployment insurance system to qualifying individuals experiencing economic hardships caused by COVID-19 in Colorado. This Executive Order extends Executive Order D 2020 230 for an additional thirty (30) days.

## **II. Duration**

Executive Order D 2020 230, as extended by this Executive Order, shall expire thirty (30) days from November 26, 2020, unless amended further by Executive Order, except that the funds described in Section II.F of Executive Order D 2020 230 shall remain available for the described purposes until December 31, 2020. In all other respects, Executive Order D 2020 230 shall remain in full force and effect as originally promulgated.
